



Recognising and responding to acute deterioration (RRAD)

This **Clinical** program is designed to enhance participants' knowledge and skills in responding to clinical deterioration. Sessions include group discussions, case studies and workshops.

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Learning objectives

After attending this program, the learner will:

- Describe and perform an ABCDE assessment, recognise abnormal results and respond appropriately in the clinical setting
- Explain how the levels of escalation apply to a clinical situation, and how timely response can delay/prevent deterioration in patients
- Discuss the principles and importance of situational awareness and crisis resource management
- Understand the importance of effective communication and teamwork in emergency situations
