



Surviving Sepsis

This **Clinical** program is designed to enhance participants' knowledge in sepsis pathophysiology, assessment and early recognition of a septic patient and the implementation of evidence-based sepsis management. Interactive sessions include group discussions, case studies and workshops.

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Learning objectives

After attending this program, the learner will:

- Discuss what sepsis is, risk factors, identify at risk patient cohorts, and the impact of sepsis on the individual and the wider community.
- Identify the pathophysiological impact of sepsis on human body systems, and recognise the associated signs and symptoms within these systems
- Detail best practice interventions to be actioned in the event of an individual developing sepsis
- Be able to complete a patient assessment, using qSOFA and the SCGOPHCG sepsis pathway to collaboratively manage a patient with suspected sepsis
